This craziness we call Covid-19, has many of us scratching our heads. How many of us have wished for a few days off to catch up, only to find that being stuck at home is not exactly what we wanted. Now many of us are at the end of our rope and we long for the old days, when we could go to work and have some stress and push ourselves to the point of exhaustion. We feel a deep sadness, about the lives we want to get back to and often we even find ourselves weeping for what is lost.

"Blessed are you that weep now, for you shall laugh," Jesus says. That means not just that you will laugh when the time comes, but that you can laugh a little even now in the midst of the weeping because you know that the time is coming. All appearances to the contrary, no matter how hopeless it may appear, the ending will be a happy ending. That is what laughter is about. It is the laughter of faith. It is the divine comedy.

In the meantime you weep, because if you have a heart to see it honestly, the world you see is heartbreaking. Only the heartless can look at it and remain unmoved, and I think that is why Jesus says, "Woe to you that laugh now, for you shall mourn and weep," which is a different sort of laughter altogether. It is the laughter of callousness, mockery, and indifference. You can laugh like that only if you turn your back on the suffering and need of the world. "Jesus says let those who have eyes see, and those who have ears hear." If you have the eyes he speaks of you cannot miss the suffering around you. The single mother trying to make ends meet, the homeless person who needs a hand, the lonely person locked away and depressed. If you have the ears he speaks of you must hear the cry of the poor who are always hit the hardest when something like this pandemic happens. Those of us who are people of faith know this is true, but that isn't all there is to this story.

The happiness of the happy ending, what makes the comedy so wonderful, is the suggestion that in the end even the callous and indifferent people will take part in it. The fact that Jesus says they too will weep and mourn before they're done seems to mean that they too will grow hearts at last, even if they learn how the hard way, and once that happens, anything is possible with God.

Keep laughing my friends and I pray we will be together soon.

The church is a part of the community. We tried to continue programs until we couldn't and we have been a good neighbor by participating in this social distancing. I read these stories about the pastors who have had their churches go ahead and meet and it makes me sad because I think they miss the point. It is not about the separation of church and state. It is not the government telling the church what it can and cannot do. It is about the church being a good neighbor and living out the truth of God's love for everyone. So we are a responsible and neighborly church.

The church is about the kingdom of God. I have heard so many stories of how you are all looking out for one another. Groceries dropped off, phone calls being made, working to support the local food pantry in a time of crisis. These and so many other things just remind me of how generous and loving you all are. We truly are a church seeking the Kingdom and that reminds me how lucky I am to be a part of that.

Thank you all for everything that you are doing every day for the Kingdom. I wish I could tell you a date when all this will be over, but I don't know what the future holds. Of course I do know who holds the future, so we will leave it in God's hands.
